### Marking the Text

- 1. Number the paragraphs.
- 2. Circle key terms and academic vocabulary (words used in history class).
- 3. <u>Underline</u> or <u>highlight</u> claims/main idea(s), evidence, details, other important information relevant (related) to the claims/main ideas.
- 4. Box words you don't know.
- 5. Take notes in the margin. Write down thoughts, questions, summaries of important ideas, etc.

### Marking the Text

#### **Primary Sources**

- 1. Number the paragraphs.
- 2. Circle key terms and academic vocabulary (words used in history class).
- 3. <u>Underline</u> or <u>highlight</u> the information that will help you answer the questions (Read the questions 1st, so you know what to look for as you read the text).
- 4. Box words you don't know.
- 5. Take notes in the margin. Write down thoughts, questions, summaries of important ideas, etc.

#### **Essential Question**

- **1.** Follow the instructions on the opening page for the chapter in your Inquiry Journal.
- 2. Write 3 questions you might need to answer to be able to answer the EQ for this chapter.
  - a. Do not use the examples provided in the Inquiry Journal.

# Engage with the Text (Lesson Notes)

- Go to the "Engage With the Text" page for the chapter and lesson you are working on.
- Read the questions and look over the graphic organizers so you know what to look for as you work through the lesson.
- Read through the text for this lesson and answer the questions as you go.
- **4.** Your answers must be in complete sentences, except in charts/tables.
- 5. When you find a key term/vocabulary word in the text, write it down in the blue "My Notes" section on the left side.

# Revisiting/Annotating Notes

Going back to annotate your notes is an important step in the Focused Note process. It helps it stick in your brain better!

- **1.** Annotate your notes:
  - Take notes/write questions in the margins.
  - Circle any key terms you see in your answers.
  - Highlight or <u>underline</u> important concepts and ideas.
  - ! next to things you think may be on a test.
  - ? next to things you have questions about or want to clarify.
  - Use as many different colors as possible.

  - a. You do not need to write the questions IF you restate the question in your answer. It needs to be obvious what the question was.

    - It does not need to be an essay, but you do need to RACE your answer.
  - Your summary must fully address the question. Use your notes and answers to the Guiding Questions.
